The mum brought her son along and discovered a place of belonging, not just for her little boy, but also where she can get support for herself. She found out more about the local area and crucial benefit information from other people's experiences. Although shy at first, she responded to Josepha's invitation to get more involved and now enjoys organising termly parish activities for people of all abilities.
