The earth and all it contains has been created by God. It is a gift, given to all for the good of all. The resources of the earth are not infinite yet too often we squander them, not thinking of future generations. How we have treated and continue to treat the earth has profound impacts on people now and in the future. Too often we have destroyed elements of the earth for a quick gain.

As we are called to love creation, as well as love God and love our neighbours. How we care for the earth is a sign of how we live as Christians, how we show God's love in the world, how we live out love in action.

We are called to renew our commitment to the planet, how we treat it as individuals, and how we hold to account how governments and industries treat the world whilst producing our energy and goods we consume.

Parishioners at St Patrick's turned a piece of derelict ground next to their church into a kitchen garden and have been cultivating it ever since. Even with limited gardening experience, they've connected more to creation; grown veg to eat; and raised money for others by selling the produce after Mass each week and donating the money to charity. It's brought the community together, cared for the earth, and supported communities living in poverty around the globe, too.
